



TINY KITTENS, BIG RESPONSIBILITY

Caring for Your 4-8 Week-Old Kitten

Congratulations — and **thank you**. By adopting a 4-week-old kitten, you are participating in a lifesaving program that moves vulnerable kittens out of the shelter quickly, preventing euthanasia and creating space for more kittens in need. These adoptions look like regular adoptions — but these kittens still have special developmental needs.



What Makes a 4-Week Old Kitten Different?

At four weeks old, your kitten is:

- Still growing rapidly
- Transitioning from bottle to solid food
- Learning litter box habits
- Developing critical social skills
- Needing structure, warmth, and close supervision

You are helping them reach full “kittenhood.”



Create a Small, Safe Space

Keep your kitten in a small, contained area (bathroom, playpen, small bedroom) at first.

- Small spaces help them feel secure.
- They should be able to reach their litter box in seconds.
- Quick access prevents accidents and reinforces good habits.

As they grow and gain confidence, you can gradually expand their space.



Litter Box Basics

Consistency now builds lifelong habits.

- Use a shallow, easy-entry litter box.
- Place it close to where they sleep and eat.
- At this age, speed matters — they need immediate access when they feel the urge.



Nutrition & Hydration

These kittens are growing incredibly fast — they need a lot of calories.

- Offer frequent meals (3–4 times daily).
- Provide a variety of foods (some kittens are picky!).
- Add warm water to wet food for extra hydration.
- Fresh water should always be available.

Good nutrition now supports healthy growth and immune development.



Daily Weigh-Ins

Healthy kittens gain weight every single day.

- Use a kitchen scale.
- Weigh at the same time each day.
- Track their weight.

If your kitten does not gain weight for 24 hours, contact the shelter or your veterinarian.



Sleep & Warmth

Growing kittens need plenty of sleep.

- Provide a warm, cozy sleeping area.
- Avoid drafts.
- Respect their rest — growth happens during sleep.

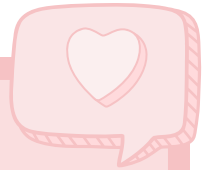


Social Development (3–6 Weeks)

This is a critical socialization window.

- Gentle handling daily
- Calm exposure to household sounds
- Positive, loving interactions

The time you spend with your kitten now helps shape the cat they will become.
